PRESIDENT'S LETTER

A few weeks ago, the subject line on one of my quilt source emails read, "19 Reasons to Buy Fabric". I couldn't wait to open it and learn some of the reasons we buy fabric. I love this sort of psycho-babble! I take all the quizzes on Facebook to learn if I were a color, what color would I be, what kind of animal would I be, etc.

Well, I was so disappointed... All there was, was 19 quilt patterns that were for sale. But it got me thinking about the reasons we, especially quilters, buy so much fabric. Do we need a reason to buy fabric? I have only been quilting for four years, but I have enough fabric in my stash to last 20 years or more. I buy fabric because I love it. I have no idea what to do with it, but I must have it; it is just too beautiful to leave behind, and I will use it some day. Other times, I have a specific project in mind. I love the look of fabric, and I love the feel of fabric.

I am a second generation fabriholic. My mother, also, collected fabric; not just quilting fabric—all sorts of fabrics: cotton, upholstery, linen, silk, and velvet. You name it ... if she liked it, she bought it. "It would be perfect for something, someday." She knew every fabric shop within a 50 mile radius. When she would visit me in New York in the 1980's, she was in her glory finding all the fabric shops in the west 40's.

When the time came and we had to clean out her house, she had one walk-in closet completely filled with fabric and yarn. She also collected sewing machines; she had four. I'm sure you are saying that is not unusual; I probably have that much fabric. I can understand ... the unique thing about my mother was she loved the fabric and the sewing machines, but she never learned to sew! She was going to learn someday.

I kept some of my favorite pieces from her stash and have, periodically, used some throughout the years. When I was going through my stash to see if I had anything to use for a valance in my new kitchen, which is now complete by the way, I found the perfect piece of green bark cloth. It was from my mother's stash. She was right; this piece was perfect for something.



How Tension Controls The Outcome Of A Stitch

Sewing machines are factory preset to have the top and bottom thread form even stitches when sewing with a 50 or 60 wt. thread. If the top and bottom threads are identical in fiber and weight, adjustments may not be necessary. However, if we use cotton on top and poly underneath, or metallic on top and poly underneath, or a heavy thread on top and a fine thread underneath, it is necessary to adjust the tension settings. It is perfectly



OK to use different thread types and weights on the top and bottom. Relying on a machine's automatic tension system is not enough.

Think of the top and bottom thread as having a tug of war. If the threads are identical and you are sewing on a single layer of fabric, both sides have equal strength and the result will be a draw. The sewing should therefore produce perfectly even stitches with no top thread showing underneath and no bobbin thread showing on top. However, in the real world, the teams are rarely equal. One team will be stronger or bigger or faster than the other. We sometimes use decorative or sensitive threads on top. We often use different fibers for the top and bottom threads. We also add stabilizer or batting. Sometimes we might use a cotton bobbin thread and other times we use a polyester bobbin thread. All these factors make it necessary to adjust the tension for each project. By adjusting the top tension either up or down, we are able to add or take away strength on the top thread team to equalize the tug of war battle. Following is a list of things that affect stitch results:

- **1.** Batting. adds drag on top thread. Cotton batting tends to grab the thread more than poly batting, adding more friction on the thread.
- **2.** Fabric type. Dense fabric puts more stress on the thread.
- **3.** Top thread thickness and type. Metallic is less flexible than cotton or poly. Poly is usually stronger than cotton or rayon.
- **4.** Bobbin thread type. Cotton bobbin thread tends to grab more than a smooth filament polyester. Sometimes grabbing is preferred and sometimes it causes problems. A smooth filament poly thread (not spun poly) in the bobbin will work better with metallic and other sensitive threads because its smooth finish acts almost like a lubricant, sliding nicely with the thread.


All challenge quilts are required to

HOW OFTEN DO YOU CHANGE THE NEEDLES IN YOUR SEWING **MACHINE?**

Most people only change them when they are broken or if they think about it. Did you know that if there is something amiss with your machine, like skipped stitches, tension or where you can hear the needle piecing the fabric, then the first thing that you really need to be doing is changing your NEEDLE.

I'm sure that I keep the needle company in business as I change my needles very regularly. I change them at the start of every new project, but then again some of my projects can take a couple of years, but I trust that you know here what I am meaning.

If I have been doing a full complete day of major sewing, then I will change the needle at the start of each day. You may think that this is a little extreme, but you will find that you do not have many problems if any at all with skipped stitches, tension, noises or many other things that a blunt needle can cause.

As I also use a lot of freezer paper in my projects, your needle is actually sewing through this paper, and we are all aware not to cut paper with your really good fabric scissors, because the paper will blunt the scissors, well this is the same thing except it is a needle not scissors.

A lot of people think that it is too expensive to be changing your needles so often, but think about how much money you have just spent on fabric, tools, notions, books, patterns, etc. Well needles are actually the cheapest part of your sewing.

So be brave and throw out that old needle and shout yourself a new one.....

Yes, you can do it,

I know you can, be strong, just reach your hand out, take out the old needle and yes throw it in the bin.....then take out a nice new shiny needle and place it in the machine....

Phew..

WOW.... you are now ready to start sewing again, it will feel tremenous.

Make sure that the needle size is reflective to the size thread that you are sewing.


