

- Seventy-one (71) Comfort
 Quilts were delivered this week
 to BRRH Lynn Cancer Center.
- Approximately thirty (30) more Comfort quilts are ready to go; keep making them ... they will be much appreciated!



- Year-to-Date we have completed 155 Comfort Quilts.
- Juvenile Comfort Quilts are needed in Trauma Centers. Crib size is suggested.
- Novelty and juvenile fabrics are needed as well as 2 yard measures of fabric for backings.
- Comfort Quilt kits are available. Janet will be available for you to pick up a quilt kit at her house or meet you. Contact Janet Fredricks <u>954-242-9010</u> or email at: <u>quilthoney@aol.com.</u>

Comfort quilt size specifications are:

- a minimum of 38 42" wide, and a minimum of 48 54" in length. If you are using your own backing and batting and are doing your own quilting, feel free to make them wider and/or longer.
- Quilt tops should be 40" wide so that we can use one width of fabric and do not have to piece the backs.
- QGbtS received a new request for small quilts to cover NICU Isolettes in the Neonatal Unit at Boca Raton Regional Hospital; so far twenty (20) covers were delivered for the NICU. The nurses were so excited and very impressed with the sewing.
- The size of the NICU coverlets quilts is 36" X 36".

COMFORT BEAR AND CHILD MASK INSTRUCTIONS:

MASK:

- For ages 4-12- You need two pieces of fabric measuring 5"x 7" and 2 pieces of 1/8th" elastic measuring 6" long. If you can't find skinny elastic, you can cut wide ones. If you can't find any elastic, you can use long strings and tie at the back.
- For ages 2-4- You need two pieces of fabric measuring 4"x 6" and 2 pieces of 1/8th" elastic measuring 5" long.
- Pin elastic about 1/2" from corners of short side of front side of one fabric.
- Lay the other piece of the fabric right side facing down and pin all the way around.
- Sew both pieces of fabric together all the way around. It may be hard when you get the corners with the elastic so, go slow. Leave about 2" open so you can turn it inside out.
- Turn inside out. Fold down the opening and top sew closed.
- Make two pleats in the center of sides of mask. The pleats are about 1" each.
- Sew around mask including sides



BEAR:


Supplies:


- Fabric—2 pieces 13" x 15"
- Scissors
- Marking Pen or Pencil
- Sewing Machine or Needle and Thread
- Stuffing
- Bear Pattern
- Optional: Template plastic or cardstock to make a reusable pattern, embroidered bear face, floss or thread to add features, ribbon for around his neck.
- We ask that you don't use buttons for eyes or other embellishments that can be a choking hazard).

Comfort Bear Instructions (Cont'd)


- 1. Tape the bottom edge of the bear pattern to the bottom of the bear at the dotted line. Use scissors to cut the bear pattern along the outline. Trace on to a piece of template plastic or cardstock for a permanent, reusable pattern.
- 2. Trace the bear shape on the wrong sides of the fabric pieces with a marking pen or pencil. Cut out leaving a quarter inch seam allowance.
- 3. Decide which piece will be the front and add a face. Stitch a pre-embroidered design with your favorite method (satin, button hole, raw edge..) or design your own with floss or n=machine stitching.
- 4. Pin right sides together and stitch along the traced line, leaving a two inch opening on the side for turning.
- 5. Clip curves and turn right sides out. Press.
- 6. Stuff with stuffing. Tuck raw edges under in the opening and stitch closed.
- 7. Tie a ribbon around the bear's neck and attach the matching mask to the bear's arm.
- 8. Send the bear out into the world to bring a smile and joy to a child's face.



QGbtS 2020 DECORATIVE STITCH CHALLENGE

Size: No one side shorter than 12" or larger than 24". Therefore, any size you wish between 12"x12" and 24"x24" and in any shape.

Theme: Make a small quilt featuring those amazing decorative stitches on your machine. Use as many different stitches as you can, with any assortment of threads (cotton, poly, trilobal, rayon, etc.) in any way you want. The finished piece must "read" as being all about decorative stitching.



Embellishments: Decorative stitches (the ones that are built into your machine). Couching techniques and use of rick-rack or other narrow trims (1/4"-3/8" wide) are permitted, but should not ex-

ceed more than 5% of the total stitching. Free-motion quilting, machine embroidery and hand embroidery are not allowed.

Reference Material: This challenge is based on the ideas and artistry of quilter Carol Ann Waugh. Her book "Stupendous Stitching. How to Make Fun and Fabulous Fiber Art", is a goldmine of information. She also has a Blueprint (Craftsy) video. and she can be seen on Google." The video is not free and is not available on YouTube.

Challenge Due Date: General Meeting on Tuesday, November 10, 2020

Prizes: Two prizes will be awarded: one for Viewer's Choice and one to be awarded by drawing from among all participants.

Sign-up: Anyone interested in participating in this challenge should sign up during the General Meeting.

6 Keys to Metallic Thread Success in Your Fabric Art BY: Quilting Daily Team , November 28, 2018

I love the sparkle and shine metallic thread gives to my fabric art, but the hassles—shredding, the curling, the broken threads—give me such a headache.

I always approach metallic threads with trepidation, and I could swear the spool can smell my fear. According to Liz Kettle, that may be true. "Don't tackle free-motion stitching with metallic threads when you are stressed. The thread will know," advises Liz, a mixed-media and textile artist.



I don't doubt it. As the author of two books on threads and fabric embellishing, she knows firsthand the frustration that including metallic thread in your textile art can produce. But with research and a lot of practice, she has learned to tame this beautiful, shiny beast.

Free-Motion Quilting with Metallic Thread

So when I was looking for someone to offer a primer on how to use metallic threads, Liz came to mind immediately. Liz details what she calls her 6 Keys to Metallic Thread Success.

Here are the highlights:

Bobbin thread is very important. I have the most success with an ultra-fine polyester thread with a weight between 100 and 70. You could also use #100-weight silk thread.

Tension is the second key to success. Reducing the upper thread tension is critical when using metallic threads. If you are using free-motion stitching, a reduced top tension is even more important.

Using a metallic needle is helpful but not mandatory. Depending on the type of stitching you are doing, a size 90 embroidery or 90 topstitching needle will work just fine.





6 Keys to Metallic Thread Success in Your Fabric Art (Cont'd)

When working with metallic thread, stitch slower. This is especially important when free-motion stitching with metallic threads. When you are free-motion stitching, either embroidery or quilting, you become part of your machine's tension system.


You can control how wiry your thread is by modifying your thread path. If it springs off your spool when you unwrap it, you should probably consider using a thread stand or placing the thread in a cup or jar a little distance away from the machine.

Stabilizers are very important when using metallic thread as a surface embellishment or for embroidery in your fiber art projects. Which stabilizer to choose depends on the surface fabric and the amount of stitching you want to add.

I found Liz's metallic thread advice extremely helpful. I can now approach those gleaming spools with confidence, not fear!


