- have a label on the back right hand corner with your name, name of the person who did the quilting, the name of the quilt, and Quilt Guild by the Sea.
- be made and completed between December 1, 2016 and October 10, 2017. **No Exceptions or Extensions**.

A sign-up sheet will be available at the General Meeting.







Quilt binding is usually cut on the straight grain or the bias (diagonal) grain. There are advantages and disadvantages of each that I will explain in the paragraphs below.

Some quilters like to make straight grain or cross grain binding because they think it is easier to make and apply than bias binding. There is also a belief that straight or cross grain binding uses less fabric. Straight or cross grain binding strips are



cut across the width of the fabric selvage to selvage or along the length of the fabric parallel to the selvage. Binding strips cut either in a crosswise or a lengthwise direction would be considered to be on the grain.

Some quilters prefer bias binding even if it has been thought of as more difficult to make and apply. It is also thought to take more fabric. Bias binding strips are cut on the bias or diagonal grain of the fabric. The easiest way to find the diagonal of the fabric is to use the 45 degree angle on your acrylic ruler or to fold an exact square of fabric in half on the diagonal and press. The line you press is the bias grain.

Straight Grain or Cross Grain Binding

The most common binding is cross grain binding. Strips are cut across the width of the fabric and then are pieced on the diagonal. The seams are pressed open. Straight grain binding is cut on the lengthwise grain and strips are also pieced on the diagonal. The slight advantage of cutting binding on the cross grain is the binding has a slight "give" or stretch if there is a necessity to ease when applying it to the edge of your quilt.

For cross grain binding if you cut 2 1/2" strips you will have 40 usable inches of fabric. When you piece the strips on the diagonal, you will lose almost three inches of each strip due to the seam and trimming off the waste triangle and selvage. You would need to cut enough strips to accommodate the seaming and waste. Cross grain binding works very well for square or rectangular quilts.

Straight grain binding is also cut in strips but the length will vary depending on the length of usable yardage. Again you will lose some length in the seaming the same as for the cross grain strips. Straight grain binding would be best used if some of the edges of your quilt top are bias. The straight grain would stabilize the stretchy bias edges of your quilt and help keep the quilt square. This binding might be best for a wall quilt or art quilt.

Either straight grain or cross grain binding does not have enough stretch or give to bind round edges, a curved edge, or scalloped edges of your quilt.



Finishing Your Quilt With Binding (continued)

Bias Binding

If you have a round edge, curved edge, or scalloped edged quilt you will need to use bias binding. The bias binding has "give" or stretches on the bias and it is able to curve around a circular portion on the outside of your quilt.

Many special treatment bindings are also cut on the bias. If you have a striped fabric, or any one way design, cutting binding on the bias adds a diagonal interest to the binding edge of your quilt.

Advantages of bias binding

Bias binding will wear longer than straight binding so in a bed quilt that is getting lots of use bias might be the better choice. The straight binding will have only one or two threads actually on the edge of the quilt. These few threads in the fabric right on the edge of the quilt will wear faster. Bias binding has stretch and flow and moves at the edge and won't wear as quickly.

Fabric amount comparison for bias and grain binding

Many quilters think that bias binding takes more fabric than straight binding. This is really not true -- if you calculate the square inches of fabric it takes to make straight or bias binding you will find the amount of fabric needed is about the same.

The main reason it appears to take more fabric for bias binding is that straight binding is usually cut from straight strips the width or length of the fabric and bias binding is usually cut from a large square. It only appears to take more yardage when cutting bias from a square but it is really not any additional fabric.

Flat Binding and French Fold Binding

French fold binding differs from flat binding. Flat binding is just that -- flat. It is usually cut 1 1/4" wide and is not folded before applying to the quilt. Flat binding is stitched right side of binding to right side of quilt top using a quarter inch seam. Then the binding is turned to the back and the quarter inch raw edge is folded under as it is hand stitched. If you are short on fabric flat binding might be an option as it doesn't need to be cut as wide not taking as much fabric.

French fold binding is cut wider -- usually 2 1/4" to 2 1/2" is standard. Then fold the pieced strips in half lengthwise with wrong sides together and press. It is then stitched to the quilt -- matching raw edges of binding with the raw edge of the quilt. Use a quarter inch seam. After stitching, turn binding to the back of the quilt and hand stitch. The folded edge is already finished and ready to stitch to the back of the quilt with no additional turning.

Using French fold binding -- either straight or bias -- will assure that even if the edge of the binding is wearing the inner layers of the quilt won't show because there is a second layer of binding behind the top layer. You won't have to replace French fold binding as often as single layer binding and the edge of the batting won't show because of the two layers.



Finishing Your Quilt With Binding (Continued)

Remember -- if you are making a planned quilt and know what fabric you will be using for binding, why not cut the square for bias binding or strips for straight binding at the same time you are cutting your strips and patches for piecing. Then label it by pinning the name of the quilt on a small scrap of paper to the binding fabric or strips. Then when the quilt is finished you will have your binding ready and won't have to hunt in your stash -- or worse have used all the fabric in another project.

Stitching binding to quilt

To prepare the edge of the quilt, pin well or machine-baste with thread. This will keep the three layers from shifting as you apply the binding. Your quilt is already three layers and they are not always quilted right up to the edge so you are still dealing with three separate layers. Then you have the two layers of the French fold bias or straight binding. If some of these layers are not pinned or basted there could be puckering and stretching problems.

I prefer to trim my quilt after the binding is applied but if you prefer to trim before applying the binding, be sure to pin or baste the edges of the quilt before trimming.

To stitch binding to your quilt whether it is bias binding or straight binding it is helpful to use a walking or even feed foot. The walking or even feed food will help you keep all your layers feeding through the machine at the same time and reduce puckers in your quilt edge and stretching of the binding.

Stitching binding to a square corner

Begin stitching binding along a side of the quilt and not in the corner. As you stitch to the corner, stop 1/4" before edge of the quilt and backstitch. Remove quilt from machine and turn the quilt a quarter turn -- in the direction you need to stitch next. Take the binding strip and fold it back away from you leaving a diagonal miter. Bring the binding forward folding it at the exact edge of the quilt top and lay it on the edge of the quilt where it should be stitched. The diagonal miter is now hidden in the layers of binding. Begin stitching at the edge of the quilt and continue to next corner and repeat.

When your corner is not a square or a 90 degree angle apply the binding the same way. Stop 1/4" before the edge of the quilt and backstitch. Remove quilt from machine and turn quilt until the next edge of the quilt is parallel to your machine foot. Take the binding strip and fold it back away from you leaving a small miter. This miter won't be a full diagonal as in the 90 degree corner. Bring the binding forward and lay it on the edge of the quilt where it should be stitched. This miter will be smaller than the 90 degree miter -- do not be tempted to leave excess binding fabric as it is not necessary and will cause bulk later. Again the diagonal miter is hidden in the layers of binding. Begin stitching at the edge of the quilt and continue to the next corner and repeat.



Finishing Your Quilt With Binding (Continued)

Finishing the back of the quilt -- When stitching the back of a 90 degree square miter or wider as explained above, as you stitch and come to the corner, the folding of the binding to the back will automatically form a miter on the back of the quilt.

Stitching binding to round, curved, or scalloped quilts

Begin stitching binding at a straight area if possible. If you have outside curves, carefully curve the binding around the curve and stitch without stretching. If you have an inside point such as with scallops, stitch to the center of the inside point, leave needle down, pivot and continue. You don't need to make a tuck or pleat at the center scallop. When you are ready to hand stitch the back, a little diagonal miter will appear as the quilt lays flat but the binding does not have a "tuck" at the stitching line. The little "tuck" will be on the outside edge of the binding.

Finishing the binding

Hand stitching -- Many quilters prefer to hand stitch the binding to the back of the quilt using a small slip stitch. The hand stitching may be finished using standard cotton or cotton covered polyester sewing thread. Some prefer to use hand quilting thread for stitching the binding to the back of the quilt because it is stronger.

Machine stitching the binding -- An alternate way to finish the binding is to turn the binding to the back of the quilt as usual, allowing an eighth of an inch to overlap the seam that was used to stitch the binding on. Pin well.

Then carefully "stitch in the ditch" from the front of the quilt catching the binding in the stitching. Use thread in the bobbin the color of the binding. Use thread in the needle the color of the quilt top. Try using a zipper foot for this stitching line. You will be able to run the side of the foot along the folded edge of the binding and your stitching will be straighter. If your sewing machine has a "stitch in the ditch" foot you might find it helpful here. The stitch in the ditch foot has a "tongue" in the center of the foot that guides the ditch area of the guilt in line with the needle making a very neat stitching line.

Another way of machine finishing would be to fold the binding under as usual and pin -- top stitch using a decorative stitch of your choice, a serpentine stitch, or a zigzag stitch.

The finishing you choose would be determined by the end usage of your quilt. A baby quilt, child's quilt, or placemats would be ideal to be machine finished. An heirloom quality quilt you might prefer to hand finish.




