
2015 MANCUSO QUILT CHALLENGE



ROTARY MAT TIP, and SMILES

Recently, "Quilting Down Under" Yahoo Chat Group, in which I have participated for several years, talked about cleaning Olfa cutting mats. While I've wiped off my mat now and then, I've never done what was suggested to clean and moisturize your rotary mat!

Following directions according to this link, I put tepid water and white vinegar in the bathtub and added my 24"x36" mat. As you can see, the mat didn't quite fit, but at intervals I left it to soak and then returned to reposition it. I used Dawn dishwashing liquid and my dish scrubber to clean

both sides before rinsing it off and laying it flat to air dry.

OLFA Cutting Mats love moisture! It is recommended that you soak your mat from time to time. Your self healing mat loves moisture.



To soak it, put your mat in the bath tub or large container (would have to be large enough so it can lay flat) and soak it for 15 to 20 minutes in a solution of 1/4 cup white vinegar to every gallon of cool water. Let me repeat, **COOL WATER**. Do this every so often to help extend its useful life.

Then use a squirt of mild dishwashing soap (Ivory) and clean the mat with a mushroom brush (soft is the key word here). The purpose of this gentle scouring is to remove the fibers that get trapped in the cut marks preventing the cuts from "healing".

PRINTING ON FABRIC

Copying photos to fabric is a very popular quilting technique. Many quilters wish to make a memory quilt of photos or copy other memorabilia for a fabric scrap book page effect. You may simply add sashing or incorporate your photos or scrap book page into any quilt pattern. A photo or memorabilia page may be bordered and stand alone as a small wall quilt.

Today we have so many products to help with ease of photo copying to fabric and most of them are readily available, very simple to use, and give excellent results.



Copying photos or memorabilia to fabric is a fairly simple process and can be done with a minimum amount of equipment. You will need a color inkjet printer, a supply of pre-treated fabric sheets especially for the inkjet printer, and your photos or memorabilia and an iron.

Inkjet cartridges: Before beginning any photo to fabric copying process be sure your inkjet cartridges are still full enough to do the copying you need. If in doubt install new cartridges and finish up the partially empty cartridges later for printing on paper.

Pre-treated fabric sheets: Prepared fabric sheets are available at quilt shops, fabric stores and in the craft department of superstores. Quality fabric is pre-treated with chemicals to hold the ink and then the fabric is adhered to a paper backing to facilitate feeding through the inkjet printer or copier.

With an inkjet printer-copier, you may copy photos directly onto specially treated fabric. If you wish to enlarge or reduce photos you will need to scan them into photo software and make them the size you require. Once the photo is scanned and in your photo software, you may lighten or darken, crop or rotate, or otherwise "tweak" your photo in anyway you wish.

There are several brands of pre-treated fabric sheets available and each one has different "how-to" instructions, so be sure to read and follow directions on the package exactly. Most brands require heat setting of the ink after copying. Heat setting can be done with your basic home iron. Some products may ask that you rinse the fabric in cold water and press with an iron to dry. Instructions for one brand of pre treated fabric sheets will not be exactly the same as instructions for another. So be sure to read and follow directions exactly as stated on the package from your pre-treated fabric sheets.

If you will be using a small number of photo sheets purchasing pre-treated fabric sheets would probably be the most economical and would definitely have less labor involved in the process. But if you wish to pre-treat your own fabric below is a basic outline of how it is done.

Bubble Jet Set and Bubble Jet Rinse

Some quilters who plan to do a very large amount of copying onto fabric may want to treat their own fabric sheets with Bubble Jet Set and Bubble Jet Rinse. Bubble Jet Set is a liquid product available online or in some quilt shops. It comes in a quart bottle and will treat many sheets of fabric.



PRINTING ON FABRIC (Continued)

Be sure to read the instructions before starting and follow them carefully. There are no shortcuts. If you follow the steps in the order given on the container you will have best results.

When making your own treated fabric sheets use 100% cotton fabric that is tightly woven; 200 count pima cotton fabric is preferred for photo transfer. Muslin has a lower thread count and has a rough texture and the photos will not print as clearly. 200 count pima cotton fabric is very smooth and the photos will transfer quite clear.

Making your own treated sheets is very labor intensive and time consuming but if you need a lot of sheets, you might find in slightly more economical to treat your own fabric. I will discuss the basic instructions below but be sure to read the instructions for the specific product you are using before you begin.

Wash your cotton fabric to remove all sizing and chemicals used in manufacturing. A second wash is helpful. Dry in the dryer but DO NOT use fabric softener. Lightly press your fabric. With a rotary cutter cut fabric into $9 \times 11 \ 1/2$ " rectangles. You need to cut them slightly larger than a sheet of paper to allow for trimming later.

Purchase a rectangular dishpan and keep it specifically for your Bubble Jet Set chemical. Do not use this dishpan for any other purpose.

Soak the 9 x 11 1/2" sheets in the Bubble Jet Set chemical for the length of time stated on the bottle. Do not rinse. Hang to dry and press.

Cut 9" x 11 1/2" pieces of freezer paper. Set your dry iron to wool setting. Place a sheet of freezer paper shiny side down on the reverse side of treated fabric. Press well. Do not have any air bubbles between the paper and fabric. Trim freezer paper fabric sets to 8 1/2" x 11" with a rotary cutter. You now have your sheets ready to use in your inkjet printer.

Copy photos or scan and print through your photo software. Feed prepared sheets through printer one at a time. Remember most printers have the fabric side of the sheet down in the feeding tray but check your printer and place your sheets in the tray as needed for your specific printer.

Photo Transfer

Photo transfer is different than making copies or printing scanned photos onto pre-treated fabric. Photo transfer is a process where a special transfer paper is used and the photos are copied with a laser color copier to the transfer paper. The transfer then is ironed to the fabric transferring the image.

If you plan to do photo transfers, you need to have your copy shop make your copies onto the special transfer paper using mirror image. If you don't copy them at mirror image, the photos and any writing will be backwards when they are transferred to the fabric.

You will need to use a hot iron set at the temperature given in the instructions. Press, do not slide the iron. Make sure the heat is evenly applied before pealing the backing paper from the transfer. Many



transfer papers recommend using a commercial ironing surface at a T-shirt transfer shop as home irons simply cannot do the transfer as nicely as commercial shops.

Photo transfer was very popular several years ago when the process of putting photos on fabric was very new. Once the inkjet printer system was established it was much simpler for the quilter to do at home with equipment that we already have and much less expensive.

More than just photos


Don't limit yourself to only copying photos to fabric. You may copy birth certificates, diplomas, and marriage licenses. Make a collage with theater tickets, programs, and flower petals. Place your items on your copier and transfer it to your specially treated fabric sheets.

Quilt labels: You may also use special treated fabric sheets for making quilt labels. Choose a fabulous font and simply type your information into word processing software. Add clip art or small photos and print it on the pre-treated fabric sheets. Set the ink as directed and simply stitch the label to the back or front of the guilt.

Quilt Quotes: Cute quotes and poems are popular on quilts. Make your own by using pre-treated fabric sheets and your inkjet printer. Use your favorite font and type your quote into word processing software. Print onto pre-treated fabric and you have your personalized quote quilts.

Photos to fabric are a very unique way to personalize your quilt. Each quilt will be individual and will celebrate a family, a special occasion, or a memory. Have fun!


33rd Annual Capital City Quilt Show of Tallahassee, The Museum of Florida History






sure. While reading this book, I found so many familiar names and places among the great stories and pure history of this state... and there is much inspiration ahead.



You need 4 squares of equal size from 2 different fabrics.


Suggested sizes are from 4" to 7", smaller or larger will not have the same effect.

Sew with a scant 1/4".

Sew 2 different squares together at one raw edge and repeat with the 2 other squares.

Press the seams towards the darker Colour.

Sew the 2 units together to form a 4 patch.









Using a rotating mat for the following steps will help:
Select a width for the cut and repeat it

Select a width for the cut and repeat it all along. Suggested cuts are from ³/₄" to 2 ³/₄" depending on the size of your squares.

From the center seam, make a cut on the right side and then on the left side of the block.




Rotate the mat, use the same measurement and make a cut from the center seam, one on the right side and one on the left side. You now have a 9 patch.



To form the new block:

Start with the horizontal center units and switch them so that the bottom piece is on the top and vice versa.

Then do the same with the horizontal units. Follow the diagram.



Sew the units together.

If you started with a 5" blocks your finish block will measure 8 ½" square.



- 1- Cut 2 identical size squares of 2 different fabrics, not smaller than 3".
- 2- Select one as the center and set aside.
- 3- On the other square draw lines diagonally from corner to corner both directions on the wrong side of the fabric.
- 4- With a small scissors, make small slits on the diagonal lines in the center of this square, 1/4" slits are long enough.
- 5- Place the 2 squares right sides together and sew around the 4 sides, with a $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam.
- 6- With your scissors, cut on the drawn lines up to the stitching in the 4 corners, do not cut through the seams.
- 7- Press the cut pieces toward the triangles to make a square and trim to make an even block.
- 8- Use this unfinished block to measure and cut the next square, use another fabric.
- 9- Repeat as many times as you wish until you get the desire size for your block.

Quilted Scissors Pouch original pattern designed by Diane Paquin Provost

Fabric requirements:

One $10 \frac{1}{2}$ pieced block of your choice, it is time to use a UFO from your collection.

One 10 1/2" square in thin batting

One 10 1/2" square for lining fabric

Place the batting on the wrong side of the pieced block and quilt through both thickness as you please.

Place the lining square right sides together with the quilted pieced block, pin in place.

Sew 1/4" seam around the block on the 4 sides, leaving a 3" space unsewed on one side only to create an opening.

Start the seam at the beginning of the opening and backstitch on both beginning and end of the opening.

Clip the 4 corners. Turn the block to the right side; press all the seams. Pin or baste the opening to close it.

Using a decorative stitch, sew all around the block closing the opening as you sew.

First fold: Fold the quilted and decorated block as diagram.

Hand sew the inside seam

Second Fold: Fold again as diagram

Hand sew the outside seam

Sew a button and make a loop to close the pouch.
