



How to Sew a "Bumpless Binding" from Lee Hasse

Since I will be hand sewing the binding to the back of the quilt, the binding will be machine sewn to the right side of the quilt. If you want to sew the binding totally by machine, the binding is placed on the back side of the quilt and turned to the front to machine stitch.

Step 1. Determine a starting point and keep all raw edges of your quilt and the binding even. Leave an 8"-10" piece of binding unsewn. Sew a 1/4" or 3/8"seam (your preference) using a walking foot.

Step 2. When you are about 2" from the first corner carefully mark a line 1/4" in from the edge of the quilt on your binding strip (3/8" if you are using that seam allowance). Sew to this mark, backstitch if you want. Keeping the needle down at the 1/4" line, pivot the quilt ninety degrees and sew off the quilt.

Step 3. Raise the needle and presser foot and pull the quilt away from the machine. Take the binding strip and make a 45 degree fold and flip the strip straight up away from the quilt. You can pin or hold this fold. Then bring the strip straight down aligning all edges.

Step 4. Begin sewing with a 1/4" or 3/8" seam (if that's what you're using) at the top of this side. Backstitch and continue down the side of the quilt to the next corner. Repeat this process for all four corners.

Step 5. Stop about 10" to 12" from where you started. Backstitch and remove the quilt from the machine. Work on a flat surface.

Step 6. Gather or pleat the quilt top and pull the binding strips down from the quilt. Be generous and allow enough space to work with the binding. Overlap the binding ends – this overlap needs to be exactly the same as the width of your binding strip. Try and have this overlap fall about the middle of the unsewn space. Cut off the excess making sure you have the correct amount of overlap. If your binding is 2 $\frac{1}{4}$ " your overlap will be 2 $\frac{1}{4}$ ". If your binding is 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ "

Step 7. Open the binding strips and place them RIGHT SIDES together. Make sure they aren't twisted. Draw a 45 degree sewing line on the top piece. Visually, you will form a triangle with the point facing you.

Step 8. Sew on the drawn line. Trim to 1/4" and press the seam open. Press the binding in half, line up all the raw edges, and finish sewing to the quilt. VOILA! You will have a perfect fit and a "bumpless binding" join.

Step 9. You can press the binding away from the quilt, then fold it over to the back to begin hand sewing. You can use the little clips to hold it as you go. To make a perfect corner, push the quilt up into the corner of the binding. Have the fold on the back fall in the opposite direction of the front.

Border Basics Tutorial by Sue Glasnapp, QGbtS meeting 8/13/19

Check to see if the quilt top is square

Your quilt top is done and ready for borders. In order for the border to lie flat, the quilt top must be square and straight before the border is applied. First, press the quilt top well so that all the seams lay flat. Important: If the quilt top has bias seams on the edges, stay stitch the perimeter to prevent stretching.

Following are some methods to determine if the top is square.

- Fold the quilt top in half lengthwise. The corners at each end should meet if the two quilt sides are the same length. Fold the quilt in half across the width. The corners should meet if the quilt sides are the same length. If one side is longer than the opposite side, the quilt top is not square.
- Lay it out on a flat surface, a large table or the floor, so that the whole quilt top can lay flat. Look at it carefully to see if there are any areas that flare out, ruffle, or pull. If you have a tiled floor, you can use the grout lines to observe if the sides are straight and the corners are square (at right angles.)
- Use a square ruler at each corner of the quilt top to see if the sides align with the sides of the ruler.
- Using tape measure, measure the diagonals from one corner to the opposite. Both measurements should be equal if the quilt top is square.

In doing these tests and you find that the quilt does not lay flat, or is not square, try to determine what is causing the problem and correct before moving on to the borders.

Cutting and piecing borders

Some quilters measure the top in several places and take an average for the length of the border. Others cut the borders "a little larger" just in case! I think of a border as another piece of the quilt and cut it to fit the top. When piecing, we don't take an average to figure out the size of a block piece. We cut it to the correct size. The same goes for a border.

Hint: Whenever possible, cut the borders on the lengthwise grain, parallel to the selvage. The lengthwise grain has almost no stretch and will make a very stable, non-stretchy, non-wavy border. I often plan ahead when I'm purchasing fabric and cutting the pieces of my

quilts. I determine the longest length I will need for the longest border and buy a length of fabric a little longer than that. I will cut the borders on the lengthwise grain first, label them and set them aside so I won't need to piece the borders later. This is especially helpful if you don't want to have a seam in the border.

If the borders need to be pieced, I generally will piece them on the diagonal for strips up to 3 to 3 ¹/₂" wide. Strips wider than this I will piece straight across, making sure to backstitch to **secure the seam at both ends.** If a hopping foot on a long arm machine catches a loose seam that is not secured, it can pull up the fabric onto the foot. The only way to release it is to cut it, leaving a hole in the fabric. This is not pretty. Please secure any seams that will extend to the edge of the quilt top. The type of fabric will also determine how you piece the border strips. For example, seams in striped fabric are less noticeable when pieced straight across. I usually piece all of the border strips into one long strip before

Cutting the border to fit the quilt top

Lay the quilt top on a large enough surface so that it is completely flat. Fold the pieced border strip in half and lay the doubled strip **vertically** across the center of the quilt top, using a seam as a guide to keep the strips straight. Leave a small amount (a half inch) of the strips hanging off the end of the quilt top and excess border strips hanging off the other end of the quilt top. Make sure the strips are lying smooth and straight across the quilt top. DO NOT STRETCH. Using a rotary cutter and ruler, line up the ruler along the edge of the quilt top and cut the border strips STRAIGHT ACROSS the edge of the quilt top. It is important that the ends of the borders strips are at right angles in order for the borders to be square. Set aside the remaining border strips to use later for the remaining borders.

Applying the border to the quilt top

To apply the borders that were just cut, find the center of one of the border strips and mark with a pin. Find the center of the side of the with where the border will be contered and mark with a pin.



quilt where the border strip will be applied and mark with a pin. With right sides together, match the pin in the quilt with the pin on the border strip. Pin together. Next pin together the two ends of the border to the two ends of the quilt top. Find an approximate midpoint between the pins already placed, and pin the border to the quilt top. Continue this process until the border is pinned to the quilt sufficiently to hold it in place for sewing. If the quilt top is square, the border should fit nicely. If some easing is necessary to accommodate a small amount of fullness, sew the border on with the larger piece on the bottom so the feed dogs can help ease the fullness. If there is more fullness than gentle easing can correct, determine the cause and correct before sewing the borders. Sew the border to the quilt. Press the seam toward the border. Repeat the process for the opposite border. Press the seam toward the border.

To cut and apply the last two borders, repeat the process as above, folding the remaining border strip in half, laying it across the quilt **horizontally** across the center of the quilt. DO NOT STRETCH. Make sure the strips are smooth and straight, using a seam line as a guide. Line up a ruler along the edge of the quilt and cut the border strips STRAIGHT ACROSS the edge of the quilt top.

Pin and stitch the top and bottom border in the same manner as was done with the side borders. Press the seams toward the border.

Quilt Binding by Machine submitted by Maureen Drudi:

- 1. Prepare a 2 1/2" wide binding strip with diagonal joins, fold in half lengthwise and press to equal a 1 1/4" wide French fold binding. This size binding will finish at 3/8" wide on both the front and the back of your quilt.
 - **TIP:** For a thinner binding that will finish at 1/4" wide on your quilt, prepare a 1 3/4" wide binding strip with diagonal joins and fold in half lengthwise to equal a 7/8" wide French fold binding.
- 2. Sew binding onto the BACK of the quilt using a 3/8" seam allowance or a 1/4" seam allowance for the thinner size binding. Use your machine's walking foot for this step and increase your stitch length from 2.5 to 3.5 to accommodate sewing the bulky three layers. Remember to use the same seam allowance when you get to the corners.

Quilt Binding by Machine submitted by Maureen Drudi:

- **TIP:** Use a NEUTRAL thread color that you can SEE. Black thread on a black quilt is difficult to see what you are doing and a white thread on a black quilt may peek out from the seam later in the process.
- TIP: As you are stitching, keep your binding strip fairly taut. This will help to prevent a wavy looking finished binding.
- 3. Turn the quilt over to the front and place under your machine presser foot. Begin in the center of any side of the quilt and fold a few inches of the binding over to the front of the quilt to just barely overlap and cover the seamline and lower your presser foot.
 - **TIP:** Try not to pin or use clips as they can distort the binding. Fingers work best to hold in place until you get this section in place under your machine presser foot.
- 4. Begin to stitch the binding in place onto the front of your quilt using a decorative stitch (buttonhole/blanket stitch is a good one!). The left side of your decorative stitch should be on the quilt and the right side of your decorative stitch should be on the binding. Sew a few inches at a time, stop with needle down and fold a few more inches of the binding over to the front of the quilt, just barely covering the seam line and sew in place. Repeat this process until the binding is complete. Lock last stitch in place using a few tiny straight stitches close to the seamline. Your decorative stitch will run along the seamline on both the front and the back of your quilt providing a nice finished look to your binding.
 - **TIP:** Again, use a neutral thread color that you can see. The more you practice, the better your stitch becomes and then you can play with bolder thread colors.
 - **TIP:** The more complicated the decorative stitch you choose, the longer it will take your machine to sew it. For example, the feather stitch gives a very pretty, elegant finish but takes a lot longer than the versatile buttonhole/blanket stitch.







You have finally made up your mind that you want to start doing some quilting. You walk to the quilting store just down the street and stare through the window at all the quilts and accessories. Suddenly, you realize that you don't really know what you need to buy to make your own quilt. You are totally lost. Don't worry. After reading this article, you'll know everything there is about buying the right tools for your quilting project.

To begin with, I have divided the tools into different categories, so you have a better understanding of what you'll need. You could broadly classify your quilting tools by the following:

- Marking Tools
- Cutting Tools
- Other Tools
- Safety Tools
- Needles and Pins

Marking Tools

The marking tools are used for drawing patterns, marking measurements on fabric, and marking the cuttings on the fabric.

Graph Paper

Many of you might be wondering why on earth you would need graph paper for quilting. Using a graph to make your patterns and designs is a lot easier than using ordinary paper. It also gives you the chance to use your creativity to the maximum. And the availability of ideas using the graph paper squares is endless. Hence, you can say that your graph is your rough draft.

Transparent Rulers

Normally, when a person uses a ruler to draw something, we think of it as on paper. The principal here is almost the same when it comes to drawing on fabrics. With the aid of transparent rulers, you will find you can cut more accurately.

Measuring Tapes for Quilters

A measuring tape is a great way to measure fabric that you want to cut. A measuring tape of around 120 inches is ideal.

Templates for Quilts

You can get ready-made templates to draw on your quilt. If you want to be creative when making your quilt, you could make your own with a clear plastic sheet, or use a template that is already pre-cut and add your own creativity to it. However you decide to do it, make sure you have a template.

Cutting Tools

The tools involved are mostly those that are used for cutting fabric. They are listed below with a description:



Self Healing Mat

The self healing mat is a mat that is specially designed for Rotary Cutters. Whenever the Rotary Cutter finishes cutting the fabric, it touches the surface and leaves a mark. The Self Healing Mat is specially designed for this one, single purpose: it takes the cut, absorbs it, and becomes unmarked again.

Curved Safety Pins

After you have done your quilting, you will need to put together the layers that you have made. For this task, curved safety pins are preferably.

Walking Foot

The walking foot on a sewing machine prevents any tight stitches, meaning it will help you stitch the quilt evenly.

Fabric Eraser

After any markings are made on the fabric, you can erase it with a fabric eraser. The fabric eraser can also be useful in removing the markings on the quilt after it is finished.

Quilting Thread

In quilting, there are different types of thread. Depending on your pattern needs, you could use quilting cotton, invisible nylon thread, silk finishing thread, and many others. Safety Tools

Thimble

The thimble is a protective accessory that is worn on the thumb and is used by practically anyone who stitches. It is a must for every quilter. They are available in practically every size and shape to accommodate different sizes of thumbs. You can also get metal and leather thimbles, too.

Needles and Pins

You can distinctly identify these pins. Unlike other pins, these pins are longer and have a ball head on them. Some even have flat heads. You can get different types of pins based on the type of patchwork, too.

Hand Quilting Needles

The hand quilting needles are used for binding, basting, and other applications.

Sewing Machine Quilting Needles

These needles are a bit longer and have a larger eye, so it can go through extra layers of fabric.

Making a Baby Quilt

It's your baby's first birthday and you have no idea what to give him at such a young age. Suddenly, you have an idea! You can give your son a brand new quilt. You think of buying one, but then you decide to "make it special" -- why not make it with your very own hands? Now every time you cover him, he will feel the warmth of the quilt made with your love.

You obviously know that baby quilts are not the same as regular quilts. But what would you need when making a baby quilt? Before answering that, you would first want to define what exactly it is you want to do with that baby quilt. You should ask yourself what purpose the quilt will serve. **Is it for bedding? Are you going to** use it as a mattress for the baby when s/he sleeps? Or do you simply want to make something soft that will help stimulate the baby's senses while it's playing, much like a soft toy?

Have you thought about it? Great! Now that you are ready to begin, I'll walk you through the process, and by the end, you will be left with many ideas on how to finish your quilt.

Let's Get Started

You should be very careful when choosing the material for your baby's quilt, because their skin is very delicate. The quilting material should not be rough; otherwise, it could scratch the skin or cause some side effects like allergies.

You will first have to choose two coordinating fabrics (about 1 1/4 yards each, enough to make two large squares), batting, and similar color-coordinated thread. Then, wash and iron the fabric before you start working with it. Next, place one piece on the floor right-side down, followed by the batting, and then on top of that, the other piece of fabric right-side up. After you have done that, draw two diagonal lines with a quilter's pencil and a straight edge, forming an X. Pin everything together starting from the center. Here you will have to decide which fabric you want to be on top and which one you want to be on the bottom. Now fold the bottom fabric up over the top fabric, folding it twice and making a 1/4-inch fold; sew on the fold. There you have it, your basic baby quilt!

Some Tips That Might Come in Handy

Now that the main part is complete, you can add color and design using your own creativity. One personal piece of advice is to not use small tidbits, like embellishments and buttons, which could harm the baby. Instead, try something like appliqué. This is one of the simplest quilts that you can make. It consumes only five hours of your time, and it is also a lot of fun to create.







